## **VE Exams**

The club offers exams for new or upgraded licenses after each meeting. Please bring a government issued photo ID (even if we personally know you) and your current license if you have one. Exams are processed by the Greater Los Angeles Amateur Radio Group and the fee is \$5. If you pass your exam and wish to take the exam for the next higher class of license there is no additional charge. If you fail the exam and there is time to take a second exam there is an additional \$5 fee. We can process renewals and address changes for \$2, but we recommend that you do this on the FCC website for free. Effective March 1, 2019 you must have a Federal Reference Number (FRN) before applying to take an exam. If you have any current license for any radio service issued by the FCC, you already have one that must be used. You can apply for yours at https://apps.fcc.gov/coresWeb/publicHome.do if you do not have one. On July 1, 2019 a new question pool will be instituted for the General Class Exam. The club website N6KRV.ORG has all three question pools with the distracters (wrong) answers deleted. There is also a link to the complete question pool with all 4 choices showing. Your FCC approved application Form 605 will ask you if you have ever been convicted of a felony. If you answer yes the FCC will contact you before they process your application. The exam team will not ask for any

explanation and we will process the application the same as if you had answered no. Questions or reservation requests should be directed to mike@n6krv.org. We ask that you notify us at least 24 hours before the meeting if you intend to take an examination so that we can make sure to have enough examiners available after the meeting.

#### ...this month in History

October 1, 1946 - Twelve Nazi leaders were sentenced to death at the International War Crimes Tribunal in Nuremberg, Germany.

October 3, 1932 - Iraq gained independence from Britain and joined the League of Nations.

October 3, 1974 - Frank Robinson was hired by the Cleveland Indians as baseball's first African American major league manager.

October 6, 1949 - "Tokyo Rose" (Iva Toguri d'Aquino) was sentenced in San Francisco to 10 years imprisonment and fined \$10,000 for treason. She had broadcast music and Japanese propaganda to American troops in the Pacific during World War II. She was pardoned by President Gerald Ford in 1977.

October 10, 1954 - Ho Chi Minh entered Hanoi, Vietnam, after the withdrawal of French troops, in accordance with armistice terms ending the seven-year struggle between Communist Vietnamese and the French.

October 14, 1066 - The Norman Conquest began with the Battle of Hastings in which King Harold II of England, the last of the Saxon kings, was defeated and killed by William of Normandy's troops.

October 17-25, 1944 - The Battle of Leyte Gulf, the largest naval battle in history, took place off the Philippine Islands, during World War II in the Pacific. The battle involved 216 U.S. warships and 64 Japanese ships and resulted in the destruction of the Japanese Navy including the Japanese Battleship Musashi, one of the largest ever built.

October 21, 1805 - The Battle of Trafalgar took place between the British Royal Navy and the combined French and Spanish fleets. The victorious British ended the threat of Napoleon's invasion of England. British naval hero Admiral Horatio Nelson was mortally wounded aboard his ship Victory.

October 24, 1994 - For the first time in 25 years, British troops were absent from the streets of Londonderry, Northern Ireland, following cease-fires by Irish Republican Army (IRA) and pro-British forces.

## The Weather Channel Cites "Old School Tech" Amateur Radio as Storm Resource

Julio Ripoll, WD4R, Amateur Radio Assistant Coordinator of WX4NHC at the National Hurricane Center (NHC) explained Amateur Radio's role during severe weather situations to interviewers from The Weather Channel (TWC). In a September 16 segment headlined as "Using Old School Tech During a Storm," Ripoll — seated at WX4NHC — told Weather Channel interviewers Rick Knabb and Mike Bettes, that information NHC forecasters receive via Amateur Radio volunteers and spotters "sometimes fills in gaps they can't get from satellites or reconnaissance."

Knabb recounted an occasion when he was trying to pin down information about a storm system in Central America. "The only way I was able to accurately document what happened with that system in Central America was because of data through the ham radio operators that relayed it," he told Ripoll.

Ripoll cited the WX4NHC volunteer staff of approximately 30 radio amateurs who gather and essentially screen information gathered via Amateur Radio for weather data that may be of use to forecasters.

Pointing to the continued use of analog technology in a digital world, Bettes said Amateur Radio "may be a dinosaur, but you're not extinct."

For his own part, Ripoll over the weekend expressed appreciation to WX4NHC, Hurricane Watch Net, and VoIP Hurricane Net volunteers for the time they donate during hurricanes and the reports they send to WX4NHC.

"Sometimes, we sit for hours listening to static. Sometimes, we receive many reports that are unremarkable. Sometimes, we receive very few reports. But then there are those times that one or two reports make a difference," Ripoll said. He noted that NHC Hurricane Specialist Stacy Stewart cited Amateur Radio in a Hurricane Humberto advisory.

The advisory noted, "An Amateur Radio operator at Ports Island near the southern end of Bermuda reported a sustained wind of 75 MPH and a gust to 104 MPH during the past hour. An Amateur Radio operator in Somerset Village recently reported a sustained wind of 70 MPH and a gust to 89 MPH."

## Ham Radio Glossary

### Editor's note:

Although I have run "Ham Radio Glossary" in past editions and have already covered it all "from A to Z" it is my intention to cover it all again. This is intended as a service to the new "Ham" as well as gentle reminders for the seasoned veteran. C-

**Call sign** -- Series of unique letters and numbers assigned to a person who has earned an Amateur Radio license.

**Capacitance** -- A measure of the ability of a capacitor to store energy in an electric field.

**Capacitor** -- An electrical component usually formed by separating two conductive plates with an insulating material. A capacitor stores energy in an electric field.

**Centi** -- The metric prefix for 10<sup>-2</sup>, or divide by 100.

**Chassis ground** -- The common connection for all parts of a circuit that connect to the negative side of the power supply.

**Chirp** -- A slight shift in transmitter frequency each time you key the transmitter.

**Closed repeater** -- A repeater that restricts access to those who know a special code.

Closed, or complete circuit -- An electrical circuit with an uninterrupted path for the current to follow. Turning a switch on, for example, closes or completes the circuit, allowing current to flow.

**Coaxial cable** -- Coax (pronounced kó-aks). A type of feed line with one conductor inside the other.

**Color code** -- A system in which numerical values are assigned to various colors. Colored stripes are painted on the body of resistors and sometimes other components to show their value.

**Conductor** -- A material that has a loose grip on its electrons, so an electrical current can pass through it

**Connected** -- The condition in which two packetradio stations are sending information to each other. Each is acknowledging when the data has been received correctly.

Continuous wave (CW)--Morse code telegraphy.

**Control operator** -- An amateur operator designated by the licensee of a station to be responsible for the transmissions of an amateur station.

**Control point** -- The locations at which the control operator function is performed.

Controlled environment -- Any area in which an RF signal may cause radiation exposure to people who are aware of the radiated electric and magnetic fields and who can exercise some control over their exposure to these fields. The FCC generally considers amateur operators and their families to be in a controlled RF exposure environment to determine the maximum permissible exposure levels.

**Core** -- The material used in the center of an inductor coil, where the magnetic field is concentrated.

Courtesy tone -- A tone or beep transmitted by a repeater to indicate that it is okay for the next station to begin transmitting. The courtesy tone is designed to allow a pause between transmissions on a repeater, so other stations can call. It also indicates that the time-out timer has been reset.

CQ -- "Calling any station": the general call when requesting a conversation with anyone. Like many other telegraph terms which originated on the landlines, CQ was brought over into radio and used as a general call to all ships by the Marconi Company. Other companies used KA until the London Convention of 1912, which adopted CQ as the international general call or "attention" signal.

But why the letters CQ? From the French, sécurité, (safety or, as intended here, pay attention)

**Crystal oscillator** -- A device that uses a quartz crystal to keep the frequency of a transmitter constant.

## Bidding in ARRL Online Auction Begins on October 17

More than 230 items will go on the block as bidding begins on Thursday, October 17, at 10 AM EST (1400 UTC) for the 14th Annual ARRL Online Auction. The auction will continue through Thursday, October 24, closing at 10 PM EST. An auction preview opens on Monday, October 14.

The 2019 auction includes lab-tested *QST* "Product Review" gear, vintage books, used equipment, and one-of-a-kind items, plus the ARRL Lab team has contributed four of its very popular "mystery boxes."

Some premier "Product Review" items up for bid include the Elecraft KAP 1500 legal-limit HF and 6-meter linear amplifier, the Icom IC-7310 HF and 6-meter transceiver, the Palstar LA-1K 160 – 6 meter amplifier, the FlexRadio Systems FLEX-6400M HF and 6-meter SDR transceiver, and many more items.

The auction will also offer items donated from the popular television series *Last Man Standing*, starring Tim Allen, an actual radio amateur who portrays the fictional Mike Baxter, KA0XTT, in the show, which has featured ham radio in some episodes.

Among book offerings in the auction are the "sold out" 2019 Handbook Boxed Set, a special defense edition of The Radio Amateur's Handbook from 1942, and a 1949 ARRL Antenna Book.

Proceeds from the annual Online Auction benefit ARRL education programs. These include activities to license new hams, strengthen Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES®) training, offer continuing technical and operating education, and create instructional materials.

All bidders must register (your **arrl.org** user ID and password will not work on the auction site). If you have registered for a previous ARRL Online Auction, you may use the same log-in information. If you have forgotten your user ID or password, click on the "Help" tab for instructions on how to retrieve these credentials. Make sure your correct address

and other information are up to date. The auction site only accepts Visa and MasterCard.
