Of course when ever you are out on 66 in the Newberry Springs area you have to stop by the





On our trip we intended to explore an area East of Ludlow called Cadiz. In the middle of the desert lays an area that is being used to store vast amounts of ground water. Some of the water irrigates a semi large Orange Grove. That Far out on Route 66, it seems in-fathomable that Oranges could be grown, transported and marketed for a real profit but water can be. These are all around the area, perhaps dozens, perhaps more



If you don't recognize this, it is the top of a water well. They are all over Cadiz. Underground is the stored water to "water the Oranges". Or, perhaps to sell to Los Angeles? See any Oranges? Believe it or not there is an Orange Grove out here.

In the mountains around Cadiz are numerous mines.




Actually this particular opening is very likely a storage room for the explosives which are commonly used in mining operations and this, the Vulcan Mine, was a very large operation.



The tanks and pink dirt would indicate that this is the leeching field where arsenic is used to leech the Gold out of the raw ore. The Vulcan was primarily a Gold Mine. Be cautious. Crawling around inside an old mine is hazardous to your well being! Just walking the area strewn with loose rocks is difficult. There are lots of Rocks to check out. HAMS are rock hounds.

Exploring further we found this Iron mine.



That is 1" or larger rebar set in concrete. They are seriously suggesting you don't go in here.
